

MY INSPIRATION – AVM ABDUL RAZZAO SHAHEED



ur college is named "Abdul Razzaq Fazaia College". Have you ever thought who was Abdul Razzaq? Abdul Razzaq was a bright star of Pakistan Air Force, born in Wan Bhachran (a town near Mianwali) on 25th November 1952.

He received his early education at a local school. Later on he joined PAF Public School (Cadet College) Sargodha where he studied from Class VIII to XII. He got scholarship in V and VIII Class. He achieved first position in the institution in Matriculation. He also secured top position in Sargodha Board in XII with a record that remained unbroken for 27 years. He was also offered scholarship by the American and British embassies to study there but he refused and opted to join PAF. He joined PAF Academy Risalpur and won trophy in flying and academics. He also received Sword of Honour. In Afghan war, he remained OC (Officer Commanding) of ninth and fourteenth squadron of F-16 and personally shot three enemy aircrafts. He served as OC CCS at Sargodha. He also performed his duties as a Personal Staff Officer to Chief of the Air Staff. He was promoted to the rank of Air Vice Marshal on November 20, 2000.

Shaheed Abdul Razzaq was a very humble, simple, hardworking, brave and ambitious person and a real son of the soil. He was very obedient to his parents and teachers. He was an excellent football player during his student life at Cadet College.

He contemplated joining Pakistan Hockey team but his instructors did not allow him and forced him to be in Air Force. He was an industrious person. Once his brother asked him, "You work hard day and night, when will you take rest in life?" He replied that he would take rest in his grave and did not want to pass away without making the best use of his abilities. He was a very kind person

and did not let anyone return from his doorstep emptyhanded. He did his best to extend full cooperation to the people seeking jobs. He was highly committed to his profession. Being son of a teacher, he introduced good job incentives for the teachers of FAZAIA Schools. He brought revolution in the college system as DCAS (Training). While serving as Base Commander, he made all out efforts for the development of PAF Base Masroor.

During the last days of his life, he was working to establish a Cadet College in Mianwali with cooperation of Imran Khan. After his retirement, he wanted to settle in Mianwali and work for the betterment of the District but he could not live longer to realize his dream. On February 20, 2003 he was going for annual visit to PAF Base Kohat, where his plane crashed and he alongwith the then Chief of the Air Staff and some other Officers embraced martyrdom. On account of his selfless services for Pakistan Air Force, he was awarded Sitara-e-Imtiaz (Military), Tamgha-e-Imtiaz and Sitarae-Basalat (Military). Abdul Razzag Shaheed is the pride of Mianwali and his life is a source of inspiration for the generations to come. I am proud to be the relative of such an exceptional personality. It is also a matter of honour for me that I was the only member of his family whom he himself christened on my birth. May Allah rest his soul in eternal peace.






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
